




Angel Island Pilgrimage: A Reflection on Roots, Migration, Detention, and Border Control:

Sometimes called the "Ellis Island of the West," Angel Island was the first stop for hundreds of thousands of immigrants seeking entry into the United States between 1910 and 1940. This pilgrimage to Angel Island is intended to offer a spiritual journey of connection with past generations of

immigrants to the United States. By revisiting the past, this pilgrimage attempts to transform understandings of the present in order to build a future where historical wrongs are repaired, trauma is healed, and people may be reconciled with one another.



A Pilgrimage of Care and Healing:

For this pilgrimage, we've partnered with the Gubbio Project in the Mission District of San Francisco, which provides people living with housing insecurity with a safe and quiet place to rest, personal supplies, foot care, massage, referrals, and chaplaincy necessary for those living on the streets. This pilgrimage is an invitation to service through contemplation in action. Like all BAIPP pilgrimages, you can participate virtually or by physically walking the route.



A Musical Labyrinth:

Launched in April, GTU MDiv student Elise Dubravec created a piano composition based on the Sibley labyrinth in the East Bay hills, accompanied by an album of photographs! As pilgrims surrender to the pattern of a labyrinth, Elise hopes the music provides a space for listeners to surrender to the melody.




Coming soon: Hare Krishna! A San Francisco Śrīla Prabhupāda Pilgrimage
